FOLLOWING a two and a half month hiatus, a partially-sighted woman and her guide dog will resume their quest to walk 70 miles along the Kennet and Avon Canal from Kintbury on Saturday.

Tracey Clarke, 49, who only has pinhole vision in her right eye and no sight at all in her left, set out in July to walk from Bath to Reading with her Labrador Oakley to raise £5,000 for The Guide Dogs for the Blind Association.

But as the trio reached Hungerford, Tim's dad Raymond suf-fered a fall at home and passed away, meaning the walk was put on hold at Kintbury.


